One of the salient results of Joseph Greenberg's pioneering work in language typology was the notion of a harmonic word order type whereby if the verb appears at the left or right edge of the verb phrase other heads e q prepositions nouns also tend to do so Today however there is recognition in both the typological and generative literature that very many and possibly even the majority of languages fail to be fully harmonic in the sense that all head complement pairs pattern alike But does this imply limitless variation.
