**Prudes, Perverts, and Tyrants** Christina H. Tarnopolsky, 2010-04-12 In recent years most political theorists have agreed that shame shouldn t play any role in democratic politics because it threatens the mutual respect necessary for participation and deliberation But Christina Tarnopolsky argues that not every kind of shame hurts democracy In fact she makes a powerful case that there is a form of shame essential to any critical moderate and self reflexive democratic practice Through a careful study of Plato s Gorgias Tarnopolsky shows that contemporary conceptions of shame are far too narrow For Plato three kinds of shame and shaming practices were possible in democracies and only one of these is similar to the form condemned by contemporary thinkers Following Plato Tarnopolsky develops an account of a different kind of shame which she calls respectful shame This practice involves the painful but beneficial shaming of one s
